### Sequoits travel to Lemont for state semi-final game

Dramatic finishes, heart-stopping moments, and, yes, a 12-0 record have all been a part of the 2008 Sequoit football campaign that still lives on.

Yet another one-point victory was pulled out in last Saturday's overtime win in which Antioch defeated the Glenbard South Raiders 28-27.

The final play came down to the special teams again for Antioch, which has been the re-occurring theme. The extra point was missed wide left by Glenbard South kicker, Logan Futris, and once again the rejoicing began.

The Sequoits will play the number one seed Lemont Indians tomorrow, who match the Sequoits' record of 12-0. The team might be able to learn something from nearby rival Grant High School, who lost to Lemont each of the past two seasons in the IHSA state playoffs.

Lemont, a team that has been a state powerhouse in the 6A bracket for years, might seem like a big barrier to overcome, but that was the same barrier the Sequoits faced in week six against the Grant Bulldogs and in week seven against the

then unbeaten Vernon Hills Cougars. The games against the Highland Park Giants and the Glenbard South Raiders were no easy tasks either.

Of the last five games, three were decided by three points or less, showing how battle-test-

ed and resilient this 12-0 team is. They have been through it all; they have won by huge margins and the slimmest of margins; they won games they had no business winning, but the most important thing is that they kept winning.

To put into perspective how good this team is compared to teams in the past, this current 12 game winning streak is the longest in school history, and also is the record for consecutive games won.

Along with breaking school records, illustrious running back Cameron White has caught, run, and thrown for an astounding 35 touchdowns this season.

Sophomore sensation Vinnie Holm broke the school record for the most extra points made in a single season and is still adding to the record.

The team has nine all-conference players named for the season, including linebacker Tom

Gerstner, safety Travis Kwielford, defensive lineman Alec Paramski, offensive linemen Jake Anderson and Louis Schultz, quarterback Matt Romani, and running backs Steve Lorenzini, Cameron White, and Vinnie Holm.

Antioch will now play its biggest game in school history against the aforementioned Lemont High School. This time, a trip to a state championship is on the line.

As head coach Brian Glashagel said during a team pep-rally, "After state, we will come back to the gym and we can all celebrate there."

A loud eruption followed that statement, but the fact of the matter is that this team is special.

The 12-0 record speaks for itself, but this team has turned casual fans into diehard fans.

It has made ACHS alumni speak loudly and proudly of their former school, and most importantly, it has brought together a community.
